

INTRODUCTION

Cradle and cross are inextricably connected on the fourth Sunday of Advent. Between a lovely tribute to the little town of Bethlehem and the blessed virgin Mary's magnificent song of praise, the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in no uncertain terms that Christ's advent is for "the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in the holy communion—with high delight—"we proclaim the Lord's death."

CONFESSİON AND FORGIVENESS

Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, who forgives all our sin, whose mercy endures forever.

Amen.

We confess our need: We have sinned by what we have said, thought, and done. We would rather satisfy our own desires than help someone less fortunate. We find giving and serving very difficult, yet buying and spending come so easily. We have become spectators of life rather than participants. We would rather avoid the pain that comes with real relationships. Forgive our sin, God, and renew within us the true joy of living an abundant life. Amen.

FIRST READING: Micah 5:2–5a

The prophet Micah, having pronounced judgment upon Judah, speaks of a future shepherd-king who, like David, will come from the small town of Bethlehem. (Ephrathah refers to the area around Bethlehem.) This king will restore Israel and bring peace. New Testament writers understood this passage to be referring to Jesus.

But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah,
 who are one of the little clans of Judah,
 from you shall come forth for me
 one who is to rule in Israel,
 whose origin is from of old,
 from ancient days.

Therefore he shall give them up until the time
 when she who is in labor has brought forth;
 then the rest of his kindred shall return
 to the people of Israel.

And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the LORD,
 in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God.
 And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great
 to the ends of the earth;
and he shall be the one of peace.

PSALM: Luke 1:46b–55

Refrain: You, Lord, have lifted up the lowly. (Luke 1:52)

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior,
for you, Lord, have looked with favor on your lowly servant.

From this day all generations will call me blessed:

you, the Almighty, have done great things for me and holy is your name.

You have mercy on those who fear you, from generation to generation. R

You have shown strength with your arm and scattered the proud in their conceit,
casting down the mighty from their thrones and lifting up the lowly.

GOSPEL: Luke 1:39–45 [46–55]

We are presented with Elizabeth, John's mother, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, two women filled with the Holy Spirit and with faith. In Elizabeth's inspired greeting and Mary's song of praise we hear of a saving God who remembers, scatters, lifts up, and fulfills all things.

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

And Mary said,

"My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant.

Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm;

he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts.

He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly;
he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty.
He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy,
according to the promise he made to our ancestors,
to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

THE WISDOM OF ADVENT WAITING

The moment Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child in her leaped for joy. Like John in Elizabeth's womb, we are stirred by the news of Jesus' birth and his coming into our presence to bring us new life. In this season of waiting, we encounter one in whose image we are made, whose hand and heart formed our inmost being. God in human flesh awakens us to our true identity as children of God, and today that child in each of us leaps for joy!

In the wisdom of Advent waiting, amid outbursts of glad anticipation, we allow the joy of Christ's conception and birth to quietly sink into our deepest knowing. We ponder what it means to have Christ born in us. We embrace the child of God in each other and joyfully welcome a more mature and full expression of the church—the body of Christ—in the world today. In the multi-dimensional already-and-not-yet reality that Christ brings, we wait for the arrival of a whole new world where joy and peace will be ours in full, and all pain and suffering will be no more.

Mary sang a lovely song of praise and thanks for the gift of her Savior child. Then she turned to face the music of the world, a cacophony of shallow human praise, criticism, and blame. After singing the last verse of "Joy to the World!" we too will return to the noise and distraction of the world in which we live. Temptation will occur, threatening to disconnect us from the deep place where God gives us spiritual birth and vitality. Thankfully we have the year-round ministry of word and sacrament as well as the fellowship of believers to help keep us anchored in our true identity as children of God.
